1) We all have multiple jobs in the AF.

3) It's up to every airman to regularly check if we're truly compliant with the published requirements. (Trust but verify.)

4) Your organization & chain-of-command needs to know the status of your area.

<u>Strengths/Weaknesses</u> (See something, say something.)

How are you communicating where you need help? Do you know who to inform?

5) Now you know where you're non-compliant, let's do something about it.

Corrective Action Plans

Seeking external assistance through chain-of-command

Compliance Waivers (ask for more info)

Commander's Talking Points:

- * The items listed above are meant to be part of our everyday work processes and discussions, not limited to when inspections or MICT assessments are on the horizon.
- * The Unit Self-Assessment Program (USAP) is led by your Unit Commander and managed by your USAP Manager .

IAW USAP Business Rules.

* The USAP is governed by the Commander's Inspection Program (CCIP) which is led by the Wing Commander and managed by the Wing Inspector General's Office.

IAW DAFI 90-302 & CCIP Business Rules

- * The purpose behind the USAP is so you can ensure you're truly ready for contingency response through all phases by assessing compliance in a methodical way that reduces biases and errors in judgement.
- * One way to think about USAP is like maintaining a car. You get regularly scheduled inspections at the shop and take it in or work on it yourself when issues present themselves over time. Each program or function is a car and USAP is how you manage its maintenance. Don't let your car breakdown on the road.
